Scripture Lesson: Ephesians 2:10

Baseball lost one of its great figures when Yankee Stadium Public Address Announcer, Bob Sheppard passed away at the age of 99 in the summer of 2010. Bob began his career as Yankee Public Address Announcer in 1951 at the same game in which Yankee Hall of Famer, Mickey Mantle made his Yankee debut. For over 50 years he graced us with his voice that has been referred to as, "the voice of God". His unique style endeared him to not only Yankee fans but to all baseball fans. Yankee captain and current shortstop, Derek Jeter asked upon Bob's retirement that a recording of his voice be used to announce him coming to the plate to hit. To this day, that is still done. Bob Sheppard used his God-given voice in a way to bring happiness and joy to baseball fans for over fifty years. Bob Sheppard did what he was created to do.

In our Scripture lesson today, we find these words from the Apostle Paul, "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."
